Grantee News

Policy Victories:

- On November 8, Governor Murphy signed legislation <u>S829</u> and <u>S830</u>. S829 requires home sellers to disclose the presence of lead plumping and lead service lines in their property disclosure documents. This law will allow potential home buyers to be well informed when buying a home. Bill S830 will require public water systems to offer free lead water testing during an action level exceedance or partial lead service line replacement. This new law will allow customers to have more robust water measures. The Fund for New Jersey grantee partners in the Lead-Free NJ coalition advocated for these protections.
- On December 7, Acting Attorney General Andrew J. Bruck announced a new law
 enforcement directive (2021-11) outlining the right to record police activity. Protecting First
 Amendment rights to observe, object to, and record police activity, the policy will allow for
 greater police accountability, improve transparency between the public and law
 enforcement, and promote anti-racist policing practices. The Fund grantees, New Jersey
 Institute for Social Justice, ACLU-NJ, and partners advocated for this directive. Read

- On December 16, the Department of Human Services announced that the Excluded New Jerseyans Fund will receive an additional \$10 Million. The Excluded New Jerseyans Fund was designed to ensure that residents who suffered hardships during the pandemic without formal documentation, such as undocumented and low-income immigrants and former prisoners re-entering society, have access to COVID relief funds. The fund originally contained \$40 million and was set to expire at the end of the year but will now be extended to 2022. The Dept. of Human Services also increased benefit amounts to provide \$2,000 per eligible individual and a maximum of \$4,000 per household, up from \$1,000 and \$2,000, respectively. The Fund grantees Make the Road NJ, Wind of the Spirit, the NJ Alliance for Immigrant Justice, and partners have strongly advocated for this program. Read more here.
- On December 20, the NJ Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) adopted the Advance Clean Trucks (ACT) rule, moving forward a regulatory path for electrifying commercial trucks ranging from delivery vans to tractor-trailers in the state. The rule requires a percentage of zero-emission sales for truck manufacturers, beginning with Model Year 2025 and increasing each year until 2035 when 55% of all new trucks will be electric.



After California, New Jersey was the first state to propose this rule which will significantly reduce climate and air pollutants from the transportation sector, setting precedent for other East Coast states to follow suit. Fund grantees Environment NJ Research and Policy Center, New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance, Tri-State Transportation Campaign, and members of the Jersey Renews coalition strongly advocated for this new regulation. Policy Reports:

- Environment NJ Research and Policy Center released two complementary reports: An
 Electric Vehicle Toolkit for Local Governments and Charge Local and A Guide to Installing EV
 Charging Stations for Municipalities. The first report highlights tools and policies that cities
 have adopted to make buying and owning an EV more accessible. The second report
 provides in-depth information for municipalities looking to install charging stations. Read

- Fair Share Housing Center released its 2021 Impact report, which summarizes key
 accomplishments. For example, New Jersey was the first state to enact protections for
 individuals with prior criminal records on housing applications with the historic passage of
 the Fair Chance in Housing Act. Read more here.
- Jersey Water Works, a collaborative convened by NJ Future released the report, Lead in Drinking Water in Child Care Facilities: Ensuring the Future for New Jersey's Children. The report provides a blueprint for permanently removing lead from state-regulated child care programs, including state licensed child care centers (CCC's) and family child care (FCH) homes that have voluntarily registered with the state. The report identifies 10 priority policy recommendations to protect young children from lead in drinking water in these facilities. Read more here.
